## Erie preps for April 8 crowds

Solar eclipse enthusiasts expected to fill state's best viewing spot for totality

#### BY PATRICK VARINE

On Monday, April 8, Erie residents will discover the impact just few minutes of darkness can have.

Depending on how many people travel to Erie for the upcoming to-tal solar eclipse — local tourism officials are estimating anywhere between 50,000-200,000 — the city of just over 94,000 could double in population, regaining its former spot as Pennsylvania's third-largest town, at least for a few days.

And that means lots of locals from residents to grocery store owners to the police — are preparing for the busiest long weekend they've likely ever seen.

"Our hotels are at 95% capacity right now," said Visit Erie communications director Christine Temple. We're the closest city in the total eclipse path to major metro areas like Pittsburgh, Philadelphia, Baltimore and Washington, D.C. Pennsylvania as a whole is expected to get between 56,000 and 200,000 visitors, and common sense dictates the majority of them will be coming to Erie.'

### AI tool helps diagnose ear infections in kids

UPMC software can analyze images against normal

BY JULIA MARUCA

Using artificial intelligence technology, doctors may soon get pediatric ear infections.

A new software tool developed by UPMC and Pitt scientists analyzes video captured of a child's ear canal via an auriscope connected to a smartphone camera to help determine if the patient has an ear infection.

The AI technology could help doctors with the challenging task of diagnosing ear infections — a job that's difficult when examining wiggly, fussy young children, said Dr. Judith Martin, professor of pediatrics at Pitt.

difficult it is," Martin said. "Toddlers are impossible to wrangle,

well. To look into their ear to see the tympanic membrane, the eardrum, is definitely a challenge."

The tool is based on a model built by the doctors using 1,151 ear canal videos taken from 635 children who visited outpatient UPMC pediatric offices between 2018 and 2023.

The researchers don't necessarily appreciate how the software to analyze ear canals like a doctor by looking at features of the tympanic memlet alone try to come at them with brane, or eardrum, and identia device when they're not feeling fying characteristics of an ear

infection, or acute otitis media.

"We trained the neural network to think like we tend to think as we make that diagnosis," said Dr. Alejandro Hoberman, senior author on the study. Hoberman is a professor of pediatrics, director of the division of general academic pediatrics at Pitt's School of Medicine and president of UPMC Children's Community Pediatrics.

# **Buttigieg:** Boeing to face scrutiny

Transportation Secretary Pete Buttigieg said the Federal Aviation Administration will rigorously assess the Boeing Co. after the blowout of a fuselage section on an Alaska Airlines flight in January.

To maintain airline safety "that means an enormous amount of rigor in dealing with Boeing, in dealing with any regulatory issue,' Buttigieg said on Fox News Sunday. "And that's exactly what the FAA is doing."

Boeing has faced scrutiny from passengers and regulators after a series of high-profile flight incidents this year, most notably the blowout of a fuselage section on a brand-new 737 Max 9

during an Alaska Airlines flight in January, which has prompted a criminal investigation by the Justice Department.

## You should stop texting your kids at school

Teachers: Smartphones are major distractions in classes; parents can be part of problem

Virginia high school teacher Joe Clement keeps track of the text messages parents have sent students sitting in his economics and government classes:

"What did you get on your test?"

• "Did you get the field trip form signed?" • "Do you want chicken or hamburgers for dinner tonight?"

Clement has a plea for parents: Stop texting your kids at school. Parents are distressingly aware of the

distractions and the mental health issues associated with smartphones and social media. But teachers say parents might not realize how much those struggles play out at school. One culprit? Mom and Dad themselves,

whose stream-of-consciousness questions add to a climate of constant interruption and distraction from learning. Even when schools regulate or ban cellphones, it's hard for teachers to enforce it. And the constant buzzes on watches and phones are occupying critical brain space regardless of whether kids are sneaking a peek.

A few changes in parents' behavior can help make phones less distracting at school. Here's what teachers and experts recommend.

## Khan not afraid to shop around

Plenty of free agent options if Steelers GM again looks externally

Never in the 30 offseasons that preceded it since the NFL introduced unrestricted free agency had the Pittsburgh Steelers added more than the 11 free agents they signed away from other teams last spring.

That 2023 was the first full offseason under general manager Omar Khan is probably not a coincidence.

Consider that the Steelers signed a total of just 10 external free agents combined over the 2019, 2020 and 2021 offseasons. And among the 11 signed last season, six spent the season (when healthy) atop the depth chart at his respective position. That made the second consecutive year the Steelers got six starters via free agency. For context, there were several instances over the past few decades when the Steelers' foray into free agency was little more than picking up some spare parts and backups.

Make no mistake, like Tom Donahoe and Kevin Colbert before him, Khan envisions building a sustainable winner via the draft. It's in the Steelers' DNA to develop and re-sign their own. And even after binging on unrestricted free agents last season, the organization can pride itself more on finding at least three rookie starters in the draft, with at least a couple more projecting as possible starters down the line.

Still, free agency remains an important part of roster-build-

"We're looking at everything, and I have an obligation to this organization, to the players, to the front office, to every member of Steelers nation, to look at every option and every way of trying to improve this team," Khan said at the NFL Combine last week. "And we're going to do so."

The free agency aspect of that improvement process formally begins at noon Monday, when teams are permitted to start negotiating with the agents of players whose contracts officially expire at

qualified for the PIAA girls west regionals March 2, where Dollman and Champion's first-place finishes, along with Walker's second place and Hewitt's third, earned them a trip to Hershey for the state championship. Dollman was the only Norwin girls wrestler to place at the state event, finishing fifth.

The season was a huge success for this team of 10. Most of the girls never had wrestled before. A few never had been involved in organized sports.

Nick Semon, one of Norwin's coaches, said the team has progressed tremendously over the last

few months.

"I think their confidence, their overall mental toughness, their discipline, their commitment to excellence has all improved over the season, along with their technique," he said. "Girls wrestling is a great add-on to the community. I see a lot of support from the parents. I see a lot of support from girls in general and how inspiring it is to the younger generation, especially our middle school girls



that people of all shapes and sizes are needed and valued.

In March 2020, SanctionPA kicked off its campaign to meet the PIAA's 100-school thresh-

old to consider a sanction. They met that goal in February 2023, and the PIAA unanimously voted on the sanction last May, making this its first winter season. Pennsylvania was the 38th state to sanction the sport. Now, 183 schools across the commonwealth have sponsored

Zumas said the interest has been amazing. The number of girls participating in the sport nearly has doubled each year since 2020. There were 305 girls wrestling in the state during the 2020-21 school year. That number swelled to 1,934 this year.

News of the sanction sparked sophomore Camden Reese's inter-

est in joining Norwin's team. "I was really scared, but once you start wrestling, you just focus so

much on that and you just forget everything else around you," she

Others were recruited to the team by classmates.

"I was in the same gym class as Jojo, and she kind of walked up to me and was like, 'Do you want to

see a video of me throwing a girl?' And I was like, 'OK.' And then I just started going to practices, sophomore Lillian Chaney said. "It was super fun, so I stuck with it."

Sophomore Giana Ruble was persuaded to join to fill a spot needed for the

118-pound weight class. "I would've never wrestled boys,"

she said. Leonard said her lacrosse teammates, Reese and Hewitt, nagged

her to join.
"I gave in ... and I fell in love," she said.

Though intimidating on the mat, the Norwin girls are anything but that behind the scenes. There's lots of support and camaraderie among the group. Lots of hugs and "I love

you's." And a ton of hair-braiding. The girls described the team as a family, despite many of them only knowing each other for a short

"They're my best friends," Walker said. "I didn't even know half of

these girls before the season, and

now our bond with each other is

so tight and it's so special. I don't think there's anything else I would

Before a Valentine's Day match at Upper St. Clair last month, one of the girls brought in pink, red and white-striped goodie bags to pass around for some holiday cheer. Sparkly pink iced sugar cookies were a supplement to the usual post-weigh-in scarf fest, and heart-shaped headbands adorned the heads of teammates as they gathered for their pre-match prayer.

"This team means everything to me. I've been on other sports teams, and it just hasn't clicked with the girls, but these ones will be cheering for me if I'm getting my head shoved in the mat, or if I'm the one shoving someone else's head in the mat," Chaney said.

Champion agreed.

'We spend so much time together. We've all seen each other bleed, cry, everything. Everyone's downfalls, we've all seen. It's a really great connection to have with someone, knowing that they have your side. It means a lot," she said.

Hewitt, another first-year wrestler, said she was impressed by how well the season has gone.

"It's the first year for a girls team, and all of the girls are getting really good this year. A lot of our first-year girls are doing really good. Everyone's trying really hard this year," she said.

year," Elyes said. Last year she said she had to compete in outside tournaments to gain more experience because she

didn't have too many matches. "(The boys) are a lot stronger, definitely, but I feel like more technique comes in with the girls,"

Dollman is the team's veteran, having been in the sport for eight years. She exclusively wrestled on the boys team during her first year. In the years that followed, she wrestled boys all season until it came time for states, where she would face female athletes.

She repeated that until last year, when she had girls competitions in-season for the first time. Wrestling on the boys team had been a challenge for her. She said she faced a lot of bullying.

"So for me to have girls that I can relate to that consistently put in effort and consistently show up, it means that I have my own family now, and it's not just me and one other girl or me and a couple girls that are the team managers," she said. "These girls know what I go through on a day-to-day basis.'

Dollman said the sanctioned sport proves girls deserve to be in the wrestling space just as much as the boys, though she's known that all along.

"Just because we're now having our own season doesn't mean we haven't been here before," Dollman said. "We've been here for a long

# Flenory makes HOF family affair

1998 grad Brice joines uncle B.B. in Alle-Kiski hall

Longtime local basketball fans might remember Brice Flenory for his deadly fade-away jumper.

A 1998 Valley graduate, Flenory apparently hasn't lost his touch over

Michael Jordan." Flenory used his silky shooting skills and defensive prowess to carve out an outstanding career at the high school and professional levels. For his basketball exploits, he will be among those inducted into the Alle-Kiski Valley Sports Hall of Fame on May 4 at the Pittsburgh Shriner Center in Harmar.

"I think getting in (to the A-K Hall) reflects the hard work that I put in while playing," he said. "It also makes me think about my old teammates, guys like Erin Russell, who was our point guard (at Valley), Josh Schreckengost, Rudy Wade, Jim

Richardson and Llewellyn Johnson." Flenory is the nephew of former Valley great B.B. Flenory, who starred for the Vikings in the mid-1970s and then was a standout at Duquesne. B.B. was inducted into the A-K Hall in 1997.

"I heard about the glory days in New Kensington and Pittsburgh, but I was too young to see him play," Brice said. "I tried to carry on the (Flenory) name and tradition, but I didn't feel any pressure. I was doing it for me, not anyone else. I was more into watching (former Valley star) Tom Pipkins when I was a kid. Flenory grew up in the Parnassus

section of New Kensington before his family moved to Arnold. He described Monte Banks, a teammate of Pipkins on Valley's 1993 WPIAL championship team, as one of his early mentors.

"Monte lived two doors down from us," Flenory said. "We had a hoop in front of our house, and he would

At Valley, the 6-foot-2 Flenory scored more than 1,200 points, finishing fifth on the school's all-time points list.

"What a lot of people don't realize is that I scored those points in basically two and a half seasons on varsity," said Flenory, who also was a three-year letterwinner in track and field. "A senior started in front of me at the beginning of my sopho-

Flenory was a first-team Valley News Dispatch all-star selection as junior and senior.

'We had some good teams," he said. "We split the section with North Catholic in '96 and had a nice run in the state playoffs in '97. We had a 7-7 (section) record my senior year but didn't make the playoffs." As a senior, Flenory was the A-K

Valley's leading scorer, averaging 23 points. In the Comcast Tipoff Tournament, the Vikings defeated rival Burrell behind Flenory's 24 points, including 14 in the pivotal fourth quarter and overtime. Later in the season, he scored 27 points in Valley's upset of Knoch.

After high school, Flenory stepped away from competitive basketball. In his mid-20s, he was playing pick-up games at Pitt's Trees Hall when he decided to try out for the Pittsburgh Xplosion, a minor-league team in the American Basketball Association.

"It was real high level. Guvs were come over with his brother, Ralph, and we would play three-on-three flying in from all over the country for the tryouts," he said. "It was an

with Antawun Harris and some oth- eye opener for me because I hadn't played in college and didn't have that experience. But I think that made me hungry and ready."

Flenory made the Xplosion roster for the 2006 season. He recalls sharing the court with former NBA players and Pittsburgh natives Armen Gilliam and Myron Brown.

"The coach made me a defensive stopper, and I played well," he said. "We made good money, and our games were played at Mellon Arena. It was a great experience traveling to play teams across the eastern After the Xplosion folded, Flenory

played for the Pittsburgh Phantoms, another ABA franchise. With the Phantoms, I was the

elder statesman on the team," said Flenory, who was inducted into the Valley High School Sports Hall of Fame in 2006. A Point Park graduate, Flenory said he serves as an assistant junior

4 p.m. Wednesday. It is at that moment that new deals for unrestricted free agents can be signed. Luckily for the Steelers,

none of their unrestricted free agents-to-be are considered major losses. For example, none are in CBS Sports' compilation of the top 100 UFAs. But that doesn't mean there

isn't plenty of talent available on the open market. Nor that the Steelers don't have plenty of holes to fill. A quick look at what the Steelers might be looking for:

#### Quarterback

Everyone from coach Mike Tomlin to Khan to president Art Rooney II has expressed the need for "competition" to push Kenny Pickett. That could come from

Mason Rudolph, who outperformed Pickett last season when he started the past final four games (including playoffs). But Rudolph is wont to at least test the market. If the Steelers go outside the organization via the free-agent route, don't expect the likes of Kirk Cousins, who expected to command big money. If the ballyhooed Russell Wilson option doesn't pan out, the ceiling then becomes the likes of Ryan Tannehill or Gardner Minshew.

Arguably the most glaring hole in the starting lineup, the Steelers already have scheduled a meeting with recently released former Buffalo Bills center Mitch Morse. There is no shortage of other veteran options: Andre James (formerly of the Raiders), Connor Williams (Dolphins), Lloyd Cushenberry (Broncos), Aar on Brewer (Titans), Tyler Biadasz (Cowboys), Coleman Shelton (Rams) and Evan Brown (Seahawks).

#### Cornerback

Expect nickel/slot to be addressed again on the cheap. But could the Steelers splurge for an outside corner to play opposite Joey Porter Jr.?

The cost for a high-level

CB is much more than, for example, a center. Among seemingly limitless options include former Bengals DB Chidobe Awuzie, Sean Murphy-Bunting (ex of the Titans) and Adoree' Jackson (Giants). Former Steeler Steven Nelson joins versatile Kendall Fuller (ex of the Commanders), former NFL Defensive Player of the Year Stephon Gilmore (Cowboys) and Ronald Darby (Ravens)

as options age 29 or older.

#### Wide receiver

Like corner, the market is flooded with receivers of various skillsets. The Steelers and former Clairton and Pitt star Tyler Boyd always have been linked. The Steelers never have swung big at WR in free agency, probably eliminating the likes of Michael Pittman Jr. (Colts) or Marquis "Hollywood" Brown (Cardinals). The Commanders' Curtis Samuel is an intriguing option.

#### Inside linebacker Is longtime rival and

former Raven Patrick Queen on the radar? He wouldn't come cheap. Frankie Luvu emerged as one of the NFL's best pass-rushing ILBs with the Panthers. Lavonte David (Buccaneers) has borderline Hall of Fame credentials but is 34. Willie Gay Jr. (Chiefs) and Azeez Al-Shaair (Titans) might not have the coverage chops the Steelers need.

#### Special teams

It is more likely than not that special teams captain Miles Killebrew re-signs, but there is a need at punter. The Steelers could give longtime veteran Thomas Morstead (Jets) a look. Cameron Johnston (Texans), Tommy Townsend (Chiefs) and Rigoberto Sanchez (Colts) are multi-year NFL punters on the market. Braden Mann was in Steelers' camp last year but ended up punting for the Eagles.

### Scheffler dominates with putter

No. 1's play at Arnold Palmer Invitational 'borderline unfair'

ORLANDO, Fla. — Scottie Scheffler figured the simple solution to his putting struggles was to quit trying so hard. That's what he did at the Arnold Palmer Invitational, and it wasn't a fair fight.

The best in the world from tee to green, Scheffler didn't miss a putt inside 15 feet all weekend. On a tough Sunday at Bay Hill, he played bogey-free in the final group and closed with a 6-under-par 66, by two shots the best score of the final round.

The result was a five-shot victory, the largest at Bay Hill since Tiger Woods in

Scheffler hit wedge to 8 feet for birdie on No. 10. He hit another wedge to 6 feet on No. 11. He made key par saves and then poured in a 35-foot birdie on the 15th, letting out a yell with a light fist pump.

Part of the problem is just trying too hard," Scheffler said. "It's frustrating to not have the best of myself, just because I know that I can putt really well. It's not like I've been a bad putter my whole career. I've just gone through a stretch

Scheffler finished at 15-under 273 and won \$4 million from the \$20 million purse of this signature event. It was his seventh career win, all against some of the strongest fields.

And it came a week before Scheffler defends his title at The Players Championship, which had been his last official PGA Tour win.

All that held him back over the last year was the putter. Scheffler switched to a mallet model this week, but far more important was keeping quiet between the ears, thinking more about the stroke than the outcome. Both were superb.

"I just stayed in my own little space and tried to keep pushing," Scheffler said.

AVONDALE, Ariz. — Christopher Bell and the rest of Joe Gibbs Racing have been through more than their share of heartbreak in the desert.

The unexpected death of the team's vice chairman and owner Joe Gibbs' son happened in Phoenix two years ago. Last fall, a broken brake rotor spoiled Bell's NASCAR Cup Series championship hopes in the Valley of the Sun.

Winning at Phoenix Raceway never will erase the anguish, but it's certainly another step in the healing process.

In 2022, hours after Ty Gibbs won an Xfinity season championship for his grandfather's team, vice chairman Coy Gibbs was found dead in his hotel room. Ty's father was 49.

# Lamb focused on finding role

Sidetracked from stardom, 1st baseman healthy, motivated

#### BY KEVIN GORMAN

Jake Lamb has something on his resume that no other Pittsburgh Pirates player can claim — a 30-home run, 100-RBI season — but the 33-year-old corner infielder also is aware it happened seven years ago.

A lot has happened in the interim for Lamb, who has learned to adapt his mentality to make the most of the remainder of his career. An All-Star third baseman for the Arizona Diamondbacks in 2017, Lamb has dealt with devastating injuries and bounced around baseball the past four years.

"I've been to the playoffs. I've won big playoff games. I've been an All-Star." Lamb said. "On the opposite end of that, I've also been DFA'd. I've also been the last guy on the bench. I've also been back in Triple-A for the first time in seven years. So, at first, I used to look down on that. Now I use it as a tool. It's a unique spot that I'm in, as far as I've kind of experienced it all, minus the World Series. I'm still here, still going, still feel great.'

And Lamb is still trying to show he can make an impact in the major leagues, this time as a role player for the Pirates. He's batting .381 with two doubles, a home run and five RBIs for a .619 slugging percentage in nine Grapefruit League games this spring. Starting at first base, Lamb went 2 for 3 in Saturday's 8-5 loss to the Detroit Tigers, driving Matt Manning's 1-2 curveball 337 feet for an opposite-field home run in the first inning to give the Pirates a 2-0 lead.

It's the type of production to which Lamb was accustomed in his prime, when he followed a 2016 season with 31 doubles, 29 homers and 91 RBIs by hitting 30 doubles, 30 homers and 105 RBIs the next year, the best of his career.

'There's no secret there. I need to drive the ball in the gaps. I need to hit doubles and home runs. I need to drive in runs," Lamb said. "When I'm at my best, that's what I'm doing. If I'm getting on first base every at-bat, I'm not doing a whole lot for the team. I'm a good baserunner, but I don't got speed like that. When I'm helping the team out, I'm in the middle of the order and I'm driving in runs. That's plain and simple about what I'm bringing

The flip side for Lamb is his high strikeout totals — 154 in 2016, 152 in '17 — and a series of serious injuries that sidetracked him from stardom.

A disappointing 2018 season ended when an MRI found a frayed rotator cuff in his left shoulder that required surgery. He dealt with a quadriceps strain the following spring. He signed a \$5.5 million contract for the

after batting .116/.240/.210 with no home runs in 50 plate appearances over 18 games he was designated for assignment that September and started the nomadic phase of his career.

Lamb finished the 2020 season for the Oakland A's, split the next year between the Chicago White Sox and Toronto Blue Jays after being DFA'd by both. He signed with the Los Angeles Dodgers in 2022 and batted .290 with 15 homers in 61 games at Triple-A Oklahoma City but played only 29 games with the Dodgers before being traded to the Seattle Mariners for cash considerations at the deadline in August.

Last spring, Lamb made the Los Angeles Angels' Opening Day roster, slashing .216/.259/.353 with two homers and five RBIs in 18 games before being designated in late June. He finished the season with the New York Yankees' Triple-A affiliate in Scranton/Wilkes-Barre, where he posted a respectable .269/.396/.427 line in 51

Lamb knows he has long odds of making the Pirates' Opening Day roster. He's behind Rowdy Tellez on the depth chart at first base, with Connor pandemic-shortened 2020 season, but Joe and Jared Triolo also capable of

playing the position, and Gold Glove winner Ke'Bryan Hayes is locked in at third base. But toiling in the minors had a pro-

found impact on Lamb. It served as a reminder of how much love he still has for the game, in whatever role that can allow him to continue playing. The 6-foot-3, 215-pound left-handed hitter is still fit and fresh-faced, so he's focused on changing the narrative about his health and proving he has something

"That's always the key. I understand people love to tell that story, that I've been injury-prone," Lamb said. "Physically, I've felt great the last two years. The health isn't really — knock on wood — a thing. It's more just trusting my ability and going out and being a baseball player.

"You get caught up in, 'I want to put up certain numbers. I want to do this or that.' I just want to be a baseball player, and coming to a team like this where you don't have a position. If you're on the team, you might give Rowdy a couple days at first, you might give Ke' a couple days at third, you might sneak into the outfield, you might get a DH day. It's just being a good baseball player, being versatile. That's what I'm trying to do.
